- both hematology/oncology and palliative care resources, advocacy efforts, and CME and educational opportunities.
- Funded research in the Burnout of Oncology PAs, the results of which has brought national attention to this healthcare crisis through publications in the *Journal of Oncology Practice* and findings presented at national conferences. Through the support of this field of research, APAO is uniquely positioned to lead efforts to reduce the risk of burnout. APAO is proud to have two of our members leading the AAPA task force on PA burnout.
- Held our 23rd Annual (and first Virtual!) Oncology Symposium in August. We are very grateful to our Conference Chairs, Jeremy Heinerich and Dwight Macero, and the entire Conference Planning Committee for pivoting to a virtual format so quickly and providing us with an outstanding and very successful virtual CME conference.

On behalf of the Board of Directors I would like to thank everyone who participated in our membership survey which took place August 25 – September 15, 2020. We have utilized your feedback to prioritize APAO's initiatives for the upcoming year. Some of these initiatives include:

- The establishment of an Advocacy Committee to advance the oncology PA profession through initiatives that highlight the vital role of oncology PAs in team-based care and ensure that oncology PAs are working to the top of their degree and training. The committee's first project is assessing the differences in APP prescriptive privileges for chemotherapy among institutions and geographic regions. Ultimately, we hope to establish a Best Practice for chemotherapy prescribing privilege among APPs in oncology.
- The establishment of an Education Committee dedicated to the development of new and varying educational content and CME activities produced for APAO members beyond the annual symposium.
- A revitalized Student Outreach Committee dedicated to developing resources and networking opportunities for PA Students interested in the field of Oncology.
- An increased social media presence in order to provide members with the most current and up to date information, increase APAO visibility, and engage APAO membership and stakeholders through different platforms.
- The creation of an Oncology PA Academic Scholarship. This scholarship will be awarded to an oncology PA currently in practice pursuing additional studies. Stay tuned for upcoming announcements and further details.

Thank you again to all of our Board of Directors and numerous volunteers who enable APAO to move forward and remain the forefront organization representing PAs specializing in Oncology. We gladly welcome new members and new volunteers throughout the year and encourage you to become an active member of APAO. 23rd Annual Virtual Symposium - A Great Success! And continuing opportunities...

s anyone who has attended or been involved with planning a conference knows, it is a lot of work under normal circumstances. When the coronavirus pandemic started to surge, we knew we were not going to be able to hold a live conference event in Denver as planned. The Board asked whether we could pull together a virtual conference experience. The conference committee and I, along with our association management staff, were able to adapt quickly to these trying times and develop a virtual symposium. We were uncertain whether we would have 10 people participate in a virtual conference, or hundreds like the live event. We knew that we would have to keep the conference affordable, have an easy platform to navigate, keep attendees engaged, and make it easy for those to participate on their own time given the increased demands of work and home life. I, along with everyone else, would have much preferred to have a live meeting in Denver and get to see all the old and new faces, but APAO's first virtual conference was an overwhelming success.

I am pleased to report that we had hundreds of people

participate in the live portion of the symposium. And there are still people signing up for the conference to date. There were three days of live continuing education opportunities from August 27-29 with question and answer sections including Best of ASCO topics, hematology/ oncology, and a LIVE Leadership panel from PA leaders throughout the country discussing COVID-19's effects on healthcare. There are also prerecorded tracts with palliative/supportive care, radiation oncology, and professional development.

All sessions are recorded and available for viewing until August 27, 2021, and registration is only \$75 for up to 27.75 hours category 1 CME. Emily Yang

Emily's interest in oncology blossomed during her time working as a medical assistant and administrative assistant at Global Oncology, Inc. in Alhambra, CA. During her three years there, she spent many hours developing relationships with cancer patients and becoming uniquely invested in their stories, as well as becoming well versed in different cancer therapies and witnessing the challenges of their side effects first hand. She then went on to acquire additional patient care experience as an ER scribe and ophthalmic technician before entering PA school at Stanford University in Fall 2018. At Stanford, she has enjoyed organizing

physician and physician assistant panels and dinner discussions surrounding topics in oncology care for the medical school as a part of the Oncology Interest Group leadership. She is also in the process of completing her Capstone Project, which surveys the social needs of 508 cancer patients to determine gaps in healthcare literacy, housing, transportation, and financial needs in community clinics.

From these experiences, Emily appreciates oncology as a uniquely impactful field in which providers are privileged to care for patients during some of the most vulnerable times in their lives. She hopes that as a future PA, she can be a means of empowerment for patients living with chronic illnesses to pursue life goals and to align their medical therapy with their personal values. Some of her favorite books which have inspired her desire to work in oncology and patient care are *When Breath Becomes Air*, *Salt in My Soul* and *The Emperor of All Maladies*.

Jessie was raised in Miami, Florida. Jessie moved to central North Carolina for all of her higher education and research. Upon graduation from Boston University with a bachelor degree in Biomedical Laboratory and Clinical Science, My Kim joined Dr. Junjie Chen's lab as a research assistant in the Experimental Radiation Oncology department at MD Anderson Cancer Center (MDACC). She had the opportunity to work with a diverse group of research scientists and co-authored several papers about DNA repair pathways and proteomics studies. They collaborated closely with other labs including the ones led by physician scientists, which inspired My Kim to expand her knowledge from bench-side to bed-side with direct impact on patients. After graduating from your PA Program, where did you enter clinical practice and in what area?

I finished PA school in the spring of this year, and last month (September 2020) I started a one-year Advance Practice Provider Fellowship Program in Cancer Care at Stanford Healthcare.

What has been the biggest challenge you have faced entering clinical practice?

I am only one month into working, so my biggest challenges have to do with being a new graduate and understanding when and where to ask for help. Luckily, I have a very supportive position for continued learning as a PA-C.

What service could APAO offer to a new graduate that would provide the greatest value?

A virtual network of PA students. Not all of us are able to make it to the yearly conferences, but now with the virtual world being more accessible it would be interesting to have Zoom lectures or discussion groups with PAs who are working in

oncology who are willing to talk to students.

What advice would you give to a PA student considering entering the field of oncology?

I think PAs can have a very important and meaningful role in patient care in oncology because they can explain and execute so much of the treatment plan that is often daunting and dreaded for the newly diagnosed patient. I would encourage PAs to enter oncology and continue to blaze trails in the field.

What do you do when you're not at work?

Stay active by running, hiking, playing soccer. Keep in touch with my family in Oregon and the Midwest (from a distance at this time). Read fiction books, watch documentaries, keep up with current events, and go to see the ocean as much as possible.



Emily O'Day

After graduating from your PA Program, where did you enter clinical practice and in what area? I am currently working at the University of Chicago Medical Center on an inpatient leukemia service.

What has been the biggest challenge you have faced entering clinical practice?

Taking what I learned in PA school and in clinical rotations and applying it to clinical practice. Despite having excellent training in school, it feels different when you're actually managing the care of a patient. I've learned to have patience with myself and appreciate the learning process as I gain experience as a PA.

What service could APAO offer to a new graduate that would provide the greatest value?

Educational resources would be fantastic! Or even an online CME hem/onc boot camp of sorts. There's a lot to learn as a new grad in oncology and it's very

easy to get overwhelmed in terms of educational resources, so having a reliable source with everything centrally located would be great.

What advice would you give to a PA student considering entering the field of oncology?

Working in oncology can be emotionally draining, however it is a very gratifying field to be a part of. If you're considering oncology, try to get your feet wet during PA school by opting in for an elective hem/onc rotation, and if that isn't available, try to seek out oncology patients on your other rotations.

What do you do when you're not at work?

I enjoy running, hiking, spending time outdoors, playing with my dog Henry, and (in non-COVID times) traveling the world.



The APAO sponsored research study of provider wellness, collaborative practice, and career satisfaction among Physician Assistants in Oncology is an ongoing project led by PAs Eric Tetzlaff and Heather Hylton. The research team presented their data from the first year of the project at the 2020 annual meeting of the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO). The abstract was accepted for a poster discussion in the professional development track under the clinician burnout subcategory.

One of the most significant findings from the 2019 survey was the significant increase in Oncology PA burnout from 34.8% in 2015 to 48.7% in 2019. Among 2019 respondents, increased hours worked, sub-specialty, less time spent on direct patient care, practicing below full extent of education and training, dissatisfaction with collaborative practice, and perceptions of poor collaborative physician leadership were associated with higher rates of

burnout. Dr. Tara Sanft, Associate Professor of Medicine at the Yale School of Medicine, was the discussant for the session and noted "Burnout is universal, and no one is immune. We are all in this together and together we can come up with solutions".

The poster presentation was featured in articles in Cancerworld and HemOnc today following the conference with an upcoming article in press with OncLive. The research team will be submitting the first manuscript from the project for peer review in the coming months so look out for the full-length publication to be available in 2021.

Invitations for the second year of the project went out to APAO members on October 26, 2020. The research team and APAO leadership appreciate the overwhelming participation from membership in the project and hope that the high response rate continues this fall.

ASCO Update

t the start of the leadership year, each new president of the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO), announces a theme for the term of their presidency. Dr. Lori Pierce, ASCO President for 2020-2021, announced the theme of her presidency to be "Equity: Every Patient. Every Day. Everywhere." This very timely and important theme will strongly influence societal goals for the year.

In alignment with this theme, ASCO has launched a new educational series on social determinants of health and its impact on equity in cancer care. This series is offered at no cost and intends to shine light on how social determinants of health influence cancer care and outcomes. The first of these podcasts launched October 21 and can be found here https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=U5hSiz11ldA&feature=youtu.be.

For those interested in exploring other themes in health equity, AAPA recently held a webinar, led by Deanna Bridge Najera, MPAS, MS, PA-C, DFAAPA, titled Bias: What You Don't Know Can Hurt You and Your Patients. The capture of the webinar can be found at AAPA's Learning Central. The webinar focuses on implicit bias and how this can impact the care provided to patients and includes numerous resources for further study. Category I CME is available for successful completion of this CME activity.

Lastly, ASCO eLearning, among its many offerings, has a course collection called Cultural Literacy. The collection includes CME courses on cancer care for sexual minority, transgender, and gender-diverse patient populations; caring for older adults with cancer; inequities related to cancer care access; and cultural humility. If you are interested in advocacy work around health equity issues, there is opportunity to contact your lawmakers regarding H.R. 913 and its companion bill, S. 4742. The Clinical Treatment Act, as it is known, requires Medicaid to cover routine care costs (such as clinic visits, diagnostic testing, etc.) for patients on clinical trials. Sometimes clinical trials are the best treatment option for patients with cancer, and when routine care costs are not covered. it can be a hindrance to clinical trial enrollment. Making clinical trials more accessible also improves the overall quality of the research being conducted as there can be more diversification of the patient population enrolled on a clinical trial.
